2026/27 SEASON

Every farming season comes with its own weather story. This time, the story is one of extremes. The Department of Climate Change and Meteorological Services has confirmed that Malawi's weather patterns are shifting, with this winter recording more warm episodes than the cold snaps we are used to.

Forecasters are also flagging a strong El Niño influence heading into 2026/27, which for Malawi has historically meant one thing: unpredictability.

Sometimes it's rain that refuses to fall when your maize is flowering. Sometimes it's downpours so heavy they wash your fertilizer and topsoil clean off the field.

Know Your Region, Know Your Risk

Weather stress does not hit every part of the country the same way

SOUTH DOUBLE THREAT

Drought in some pockets, flooding in others, often in the same season, sometimes in the same district.

CENTRAL MIXED BAG

Dry spells punctuated by sudden heavy downpours. Neither can be planned for in isolation.

NORTH MOISTURE STRESS

Deals mainly with moisture stress, the classic El Niño signature for the region.

Wherever your farm sits, the response is the same: prepare early, plant smart, and protect what you grow.

The 2026/27 season will reward the farmer who prepared before the first effective rains, not the one who waited to see what the sky would do.

Cast your net wide with the right seed

Plant early, timing is everything

Don't wait and see. Get seed into the ground with the **first effective rains** so your crop has the best chance to mature before dry spells set in.

Harvest the water before it harvests you

Moisture management can make or break your season. **Mulching, swales and tied ridges** lock moisture into your soil during dry spells. Trenches and raised seedbeds protect your fields when the rain comes down hard and fast.

4

Don't put all your eggs in one basket

Hardy crops like **sweet potatoes, cassava, sorghum, rice and legumes** alongside your maize spread your risk and your income across the season.

5

Get ahead of pests and disease

Warmer nights and longer dry spells mean pest and disease pressure will likely be higher this season. Regular field scouting and early stocking of crop protection inputs will save you costly surprises later.

Difficult weather doesn't have to mean a difficult harvest

Farmers who plant early, choose the right seed mix, manage their water, diversify their crops and stay ahead of pests are the ones who protect their yields and their livelihoods no matter what the season brings.
